President's Message - Plant a Seed

"Plant a Seed" is an idiom that means to cause an idea, feeling, or doubt to begin in someone's mind. Metaphorically, this phrase uses the analogy of a seed, which, when planted, has the potential to grow into something larger. It implies the beginning of something, the potential for growth, the seed of an idea, feeling, or, conversely, even doubt, all of which can germinate and blossom into something more significant over time. Merriam-Webster dictionary states that to "plant a seed" is to create a situation in which (something) is likely or certain to develop. To "plant a seed" can also be a new beginning, reconciliation, and community rebuilding, collaborating with each other, like the soil ecosystem. Seeds in nearly every culture worldwide have long been considered a metaphor for survival and rebirth; something so small and delicate can grow into something strong and beautiful.

In 2025, it is the right time to "plant the seed" of growth into our Fair that has been dormant for years. And just like a seed, all parts must come together to grow and produce something beautiful. For the Sooke Fall Fair, 2025 marks 112 years of tradition and celebration. Over the past century, many seeds have been planted and our community has seen its fair share of changes, but none more dramatic than the past 5 years. Change can be terrifying. However, it can also be exceedingly exciting. Our community has been steadfast in its ability to adapt and grow to the changing demographics, multiple building projects, and creation of new communities in town. Like in the soil, all of the micro and macro organisms, living creatures have a specific purpose, and all work together to grow and create a hospitable environment for seeds to grow. Creating a beautiful home. Some seeds, such as Lodgepole Pine, Red Cedar, and Kinnikinnick (bearberry), need to go through a violent process, such as fire, to germinate. They then grow into majestic giants, useful shrubs, and grow into the beautiful forests and landscapes which we love, honour, and cherish. Similar to our community, the drastic changes we've seen recently allow us to grow into a majestic giant while nurturing the heart and soul of our community.

The Sooke Fall Fair has an incredible group of dedicated and hardworking volunteers who work tirelessly to ensure our fair runs. I would be remiss if I didn't mention the support of community organizations and businesses. Without the support of these businesses and organizations working together to better our Fair and community, the Sooke Fall Fair would cease to operate. Especially in the uncertain and unprecedented times we are in. Just like the Soil Food Web, the volunteers, businesses, and organizations work together to create this century-old tradition in Sooke, which is now in our very DNA of who we are. The tireless efforts and dedicated work of all these people, including those who attend and participate in our Fair, ensure that our 112-year-old Sooke Tradition continues and moves forward for at least another century.



Produce Section Rules:

- ONLY 1 entry per class.
- 2. Entries requiring more than one specimen should be as uniform as possible in colour, shape and size.
- 3. The number of fruits or vegetables exhibited must be the exact number listed for the class.
- 4. Verify the length and width of your entries to ensure that it meets the defined class requirements. Eg. Zucchini under 10" or 25 cm.
- 5. Entries shall be DISQUALIFIED if they fail to meet the requirements for that class.
- 6. Entries shall be named as to variety, for example: Beans Scarlet Runner, Cucumber Marketmore, and written on the tag for the benefit of the Judges and the viewing public.
- 7. Entries will displayed on plates provided by Sooke Fall Fair unless specified otherwise. Sooke Fall Fair will have the plates the day the entries are submitted.
- 8. Number of specimens will be listed beside the entry. E.g.. Apples (5), Strawberries (12)
- 9. Green Nuts not allowed, you can use last years yield.
- 10. Onions and garlic should be trimmed. For onions, leave 2" of the stalk and fold over and band with an elastic. For Garlic, trim stalk to 34".
- 11. All entries should be edible and non-psychotropic.
- AOV means Any Other Variety; (that variety is not listed in any class). They SHALL be named. Eg. Strawberries, everbearing, Kent.

FRUIT PRESENTATION NOTES:

All fruits in a class should be approximately the same size and colour, and be free from blemishes such as insect damage, fungus or disease.

Berries are shown with stems attached (blackberries and blueberries will be judged with or without stems).

Apples and pears should have stems attached and be wiped. Peach stems must not be removed. Plums, grapes and kiwis should have stems attached and bloom left on.

Nuts must be edible, so no green nuts are allowed. For AV and AOV classes, please include the variety on your entry tag.

All displays should be free from insect damage or disease.

VEGETABLE PRESENTATION NOTES:

Vegetables should be displayed in the following manner:

Tomatoes - stems attached.

Carrots - tops removed to 1" from crown.

Beets - roots intact, 1" stem.

Onions - roots removed and 2" stem folded over with an elastic band.

Garlic - stalk trimmed to 34".

Peas and bean pods - uniform in size and length, stems attached.

Cabbage - outer leaves intact.

Cauliflower - leaves trimmed just below the curd.

Flower Section Rules:

DEFINITIONS:

BLOOM: Means NO buds allowed.

BASKET: A decorative, usually flared container with a fixed handle (except hanging basket). It may be made of

woven wicker, metal, paper, papier-mâché, china or lace, with a waterproof lining.

BOWL: A container with the inside mouth dimension LARGER than the HEIGHT of the container, measured

from the surface of the table to the highest point.

VASE: A container with the inside mouth dimension SMALLER than the HEIGHT of the container, measured

from the surface of the table to the highest point.

SNIFTER: A large short stemmed glass goblet with the bowl narrowing toward the top.

SPIKE: A thick upright stem carrying several flowers (e.g. gladiolus).

SPRAY: A portion of a plant, laterals or side shoots with a number of flowers on the stem, buds may be present.

STEM OR

STOCK: A plant structure, carrying one or more flowers. Buds may be present, and it may be branched like a

bearded iris.

SPECIMEN: Any stem, terminating in a bloom. NO side buds permitted.

FOLIAGE: Where used in bowls, vases or baskets, any foliage or baby's breath may be included.

NAS: Notation on exhibit card means - Not According to Schedule.

NOVICE: An exhibitor who has not entered that class previously.

Decorative Flowers

Divisions 02-H and 02-I ADVANCE ENTRY ONLY

ONLY in these two divisions the exhibitor need not necessarily grow the flowers used.

Some fresh plant material must be used in all entries except where specifically stated.

NO SILK or ARTIFICIAL flowers allowed. Divisions 02-H and 02-I are displayed in niches, size 28" wide x 38" high x 12" deep.

NOVICE is an exhibitor who has not won more than 3 firsts in a decorative show

TITLES ARE MEANT TO BE INSPIRATIONAL & NEED NOT BE TAKEN LITERALLY.

INTERNATIONAL RULES:

- 1. An exhibit is plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specified by the schedule.
- 2. Plant material should predominate over all other components used in an exhibit.
- 3. No artificial plant material may be used unless stated.
- 4. Living plant material, when cut, must be in water or water retaining material, with the exception of succulents or other water-retaining plants, fruits, and vegetables.
- 5. Painted and/or surface material may be used unless stated otherwise.

- 2 Modern Quilt: Quilts with a contemporary designs, bold colours and unique patterns that show the quilter's creativity.
- Quilted Bag and Tote: A quilted bag consists of multiple layers of fabric stitched together to create a textured and visually appealing pattern or design on the exterior. This process involves sandwiching a layer of batting of your choice between the outer fabric and a lining fabric. A sewn bag is made by sewing different types and styles of fabric pieces together using a different sewing technique and has less of a patchwork effect. Typically, no batting used.

- 2. An entrant may only enter once in each class, except for section og Wine & Beer.
- 3. Except for the Sookeini Race and Scarecrow Contest (which are free), entry fees are \$1 per adult entry and 50¢ for juniors and youth when submitted no later than 5:00 pm on the Tuesday before the fair. After that the price doubles for late entries.
- 4. There are 3 ways to enter:
 - (a) you can use our online entry system on sookefallfair.ca
 - (b) you can fill in an entry form and either mail it to Sooke Fall Fair Association, Box 291, Sooke, BC, V9Z oS9; or drop it off in the entry box at Forbes Pharmacy 6691 Logan Lane
 - (c) you can fill in an entry form, scan it, and email it to entries@sookefallfair.ca
 - For when and where you can pickup the entry tags, please check our website nearer the time.
- 5. All entries must be made on official forms (or using the Online Entry system). Only one exhibitor per form (except where specified). Please make photocopies as necessary or download from website www.sookefallfair.ca. Any entry form used by more than one entrant will be void.
- 6. All exhibits must be grown by or be the work of the exhibitor and must have been completed in the two years prior to the fair.
- 7. Some sections require advance notification due to size limitations and set up requirements. Please refer to individual sections for detailed instructions, such as Animal Sections.
- 8. Non-Perishable Entries will be accepted at Fred Milne Park on the Thursday before the fair 2:00 to 8:00 pm. Perishable Entries will be accepted on Friday at the fairground from 2:00 to 7:30 pm. Signs will direct entrants to applicable entrance. We ask exhibitors to complete entry forms before arriving at the hall. Animals brought Saturday morning should be presented with entry tags. If any entry form has not been previously submitted for the animal, please provide a completed entry form with payment attached.
- 9. Sooke Fall Fair Association takes every precaution to ensure the safety of all exhibits, but should any item be lost, dam aged or stolen, the Association will not recognize any claim for payment or the value of any portion thereof.
- 10. The Judge's decisions are final. Not all positions (1st, 2nd, 3rd) have to be filled. For example, a single entry in a class does not automatically deem it first place (or any place).

Exhibitors Obligations and Liabilities

- 11. The committee reserves the right to refuse any entries from an exhibitor who has not complied with the rules or may cancel any or all prizes awarded to such an exhibitor.
- 12. No one will be admitted to the exhibit areas on Saturday morning during the judging except Judges and Officials.
- 13. No claim or injury to any person or property shall be assented or suit instituted or maintained against the Sooke Fall Fair Association, its officers, or their agents, by or on behalf of any visitor, exhibitor, or any person, firm or corporation, or their agents, representatives, servants, or employees having license of privilege to visit or exhibit any section of the Sooke Fall Fair.
- 14. Entries must not be removed before 5:00 pm and no later than 6:00 pm on Sunday. Livestock can be removed after 3:00 pm Sunday.

Trophies and Awards

- 15. Prize money must be picked up at the fair between 4:00 pm and 5:30 pm, Sunday. Note: Any monies not collected by 5:30 will revert to the Sooke Fall Fair Association.
- 16. Trophies and Awards will be based on 3 points for first, 2 points for second and 1 point for third. Prize money is \$3 for first, \$2 for second and \$1 for third. To qualify for a "Most Points" trophy an individual must have a minimum of 2 winning entries in the applicable section. In the event of a points tie, the person with the most first place entries wins. At the Awards Ceremony, the winner will receive a framed photo of themselves with the trophy. Their name will be engraved on the trophy. Trophies will not be taken home by the winner.
- 17. Children must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- 18. Please respect all exhibits. Do Not Touch.
- 19. No Smoking, Drugs or Alcohol are permitted at the Fair.
