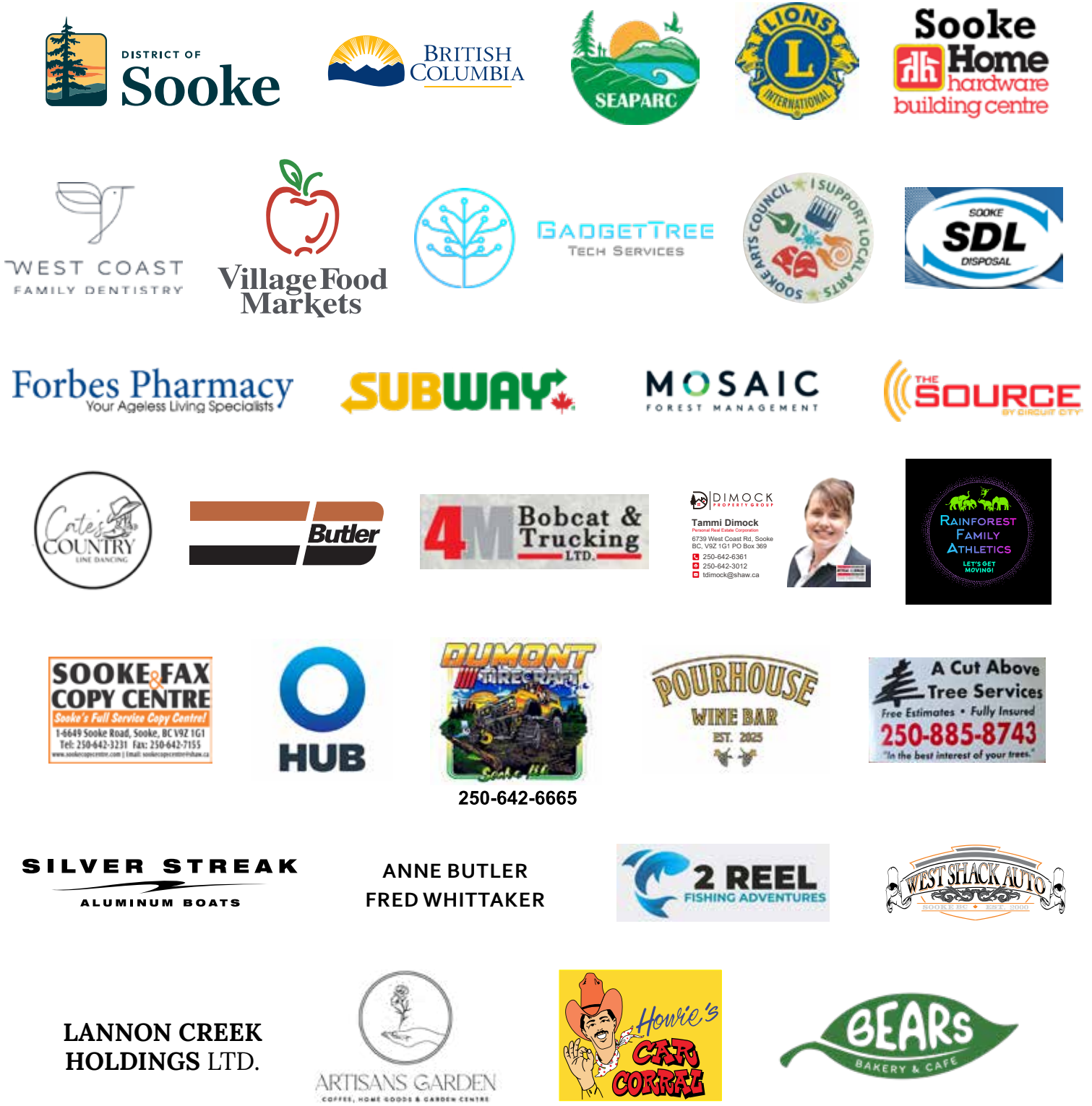

## What's new for 2026?

No change of venue this year! But there have been various changes. Here are the major ones:

We have added 2 new sections. Section 12 is Traditional Arts, which includes many classes that were moved from other sections (such as Indigenous Carving) plus many many new categories. Section 13 is Hemp and Cannabis (for those 19 and older!)

The Animals (adult) and Animals (Junior) sections have been combined into one section (11). The differentiation of entrants is by Division.

Section 23, previously Junior Canning, has been removed; its classes are now in section 21 Junior Kitchencraft.

Section 03 has been renamed from "Kitchencraft" to "From The Kitchen".

Section 35 has been renamed from "Teen Youth" to "Young Adult".

Entry drop-offs will be on Friday only this year, between noon and 8 pm. There are 2 exceptions to this:

Animal entries and Literary Arts (section 08) entries. For animals, if you cannot make the drop-offs on Friday or may be later than 8 pm, please contact the fair. Please remember we want you to enter so we can make case-by-case accommodations.

Literary Arts entries: please send them in to the fair by Wednesday evening, by 8 pm. You can send it by email or mail. If none of that works for you, we can make alternate arrangements.

### Produce Section Rules:

1. ONLY 1 entry per class.
2. Entries requiring more than one specimen should be as uniform as possible in colour, shape and size.
3. The number of fruits or vegetables exhibited must be the exact number listed for the class.
4. Verify the length and width of your entries to ensure that it meets the defined class requirements. e.g. Zucchini under 10" or 25 cm.
5. AOV means Any Other Variety; (that variety is not listed in any class). They SHALL be named. e.g. Strawberries, everbearing, Kent.
6. Entries shall be named as to variety, for example: Beans - Scarlet Runner, Cucumber Marketmore, and written on the tag for the benefit of the Judges and the viewing public.
7. Entries will displayed on plates provided by Sooke Fall Fair unless specified otherwise. Sooke Fall Fair will have the plates the day the entries are submitted.
8. Number of specimens will be listed beside the entry. e.g.. Apples (5), Strawberries (12)
9. Green Nuts not allowed, you can use last years yield.
10. Onions and garlic should be trimmed. For onions, leave 2" of the stalk and fold over and band with an elastic. For Garlic, trim stalk to ¾".
11. All entries should be edible and non-psychoactive.
12. Entries shall be DISQUALIFIED if they fail to meet the requirements for that class.

## FRUIT PRESENTATION NOTES:

All fruits in a class should be approximately the same size and colour, and be free from blemishes such as insect damage, fungus or disease.

Berries are shown with stems attached (blackberries and blueberries will be judged with or without stems).

Apples and pears should have stems attached and be wiped. Peach stems must not be removed. Plums, grapes and kiwis should have stems attached and bloom left on.

Nuts must be edible, so no green nuts are allowed. For AV and AOV classes, please include the variety on your entry tag.

All displays should be free from insect damage or disease.

Vegetables should be displayed in the following manner:

Tomatoes - stems attached.

Carrots - tops removed to 1" from crown.

Beets - roots intact, 1" stem.

Onions - roots removed and 2" stem folded over with an elastic band.

Garlic - stalk trimmed to ¾".

Peas and bean pods - uniform in size and length, stems attached.

Cabbage - outer leaves intact.

Cauliflower - leaves trimmed just below the curd.

Collection of herbs - please clearly label your varieties

### Flower Section Rules:

#### DEFINITIONS:

- BLOOM:** Means NO buds allowed.
- BASKET:** A decorative, usually flared container with a fixed handle (except hanging basket). It may be made of woven wicker, metal, paper, papier-mâché, china or lace, with a waterproof lining.
- BOWL:** A container with the inside mouth dimension LARGER than the HEIGHT of the container, measured from the surface of the table to the highest point.
- VASE:** A container with the inside mouth dimension SMALLER than the HEIGHT of the container, measured from the surface of the table to the highest point.
- SNIFTER:** A large short stemmed glass goblet with the bowl narrowing toward the top.
- SPIKE:** A thick upright stem carrying several flowers (e.g. gladiolus).
- SPRAY:** A portion of a plant, laterals or side shoots with a number of flowers on the stem, buds may be present.
- STEM OR STOCK:** A plant structure, carrying one or more flowers. Buds may be present, and it may be branched like a bearded iris.
- SPECIMEN:** Any stem, terminating in a bloom. NO side buds permitted.
- FOLIAGE:** Where used in bowls, vases or baskets, any foliage or baby's breath may be included.
- NAS:** Notation on exhibit card means - Not According to Schedule.
- NOVICE:** An exhibitor who has not entered that class previously.

### Decorative Flowers

Divisions 02-H and 02-I ADVANCE ENTRY ONLY

ONLY in these two divisions the exhibitor need not necessarily grow the flowers used.

Some fresh plant material must be used in all entries except where specifically stated.

NO SILK or ARTIFICIAL flowers allowed. Divisions 02-H and 02-I are displayed in niches, size 28" wide x 38" high x 12" deep.

After the layers are assembled, the edges of the quilt are finished with a binding, which can be sewn by hand or by machine, creating a neat and durable edge for the quilt.
- 2 Modern Quilt: Quilts with a contemporary designs, bold colours and unique patterns that show the quilter's creativity.
- 3 Quilted Bag and Tote: A quilted bag consists of multiple layers of fabric stitched together to create a textured and visually appealing pattern or design on the exterior. This process involves sandwiching a layer of batting of your choice between the outer fabric and a lining fabric. A sewn bag is made by sewing different types and styles of fabric pieces together using a different sewing technique and has less of a patchwork effect. Typically, no batting used.

# Notice to Exhibitors - Regulations

1. An entry form must be filled out for every item entered in the Fair, except for free entry items (see rule 3). We prefer advance entries and pick-ups, if possible, so we can create tags on time and address any issues promptly. As well, it reduces line-ups and wait times on Friday during late entry and drop-offs. New for 2026; due to the new location and setup, entries will only be received on Friday between 12:00 pm - 8:00 pm. If you cannot make the Friday drop-off or tag pick-up, please contact the fair.
2. An entrant may only enter once in each class, except for section 09 Wine & Beer.
3. Except for the Pet Parade, Sookeini Race, Scarecrow Contest and Colour Contest (which are all free), entry fees are \$1 per adult entry and 50¢ for juniors and young adult when submitted no later than 5:00 pm on the Tuesday before the fair. After that the price doubles.
4. There are 3 ways to enter:
  - (a) you can use our online entry system; go to <https://sookefallfair.ca/sff/entries.php>
  - (b) you can fill in an entry form and either mail it to Sooke Fall Fair Association, Box 291, Sooke, BC, V9Z 0S9; or drop it off in the entry box at Forbes Pharmacy 6691 Logan Lane
  - (c) you can fill in an entry form, scan it, and email it to [entries@sookefallfair.ca](mailto:entries@sookefallfair.ca)For when and where you can pickup the entry tags, please check our website nearer the time.
5. All entries must be made on official forms (or using the Online Entry system). Only one exhibitor per form (except where specified). Please make photocopies as necessary or download from website [www.sookefallfair.ca](http://www.sookefallfair.ca). Any entry form used by more than one entrant will be void.
6. All exhibits must be grown by or be the work of the exhibitor and must have been completed in the two years prior to the fair.
7. Some sections require advance notification due to size limitations and set up requirements. Please refer to individual sections for detailed instructions, such as Animal Sections.
8. All Entries, except animal entries, will be received on Friday only between noon and 8 pm. If an exhibitor cannot make the Friday drop-off or will be late, please contact the fair so we can make alternate arrangements. Please remember we'd like you to enter, and we can accommodate as needed. Animal entries can be dropped off between 7-8:30 on Saturday morning. Tags can be picked up on Friday or for an early pickup (time and date to be determined). If you cannot pick up on Friday or early pick up, or are going to be late, please contact the fair. New for 2026: Literary arts entries must be submitted to the fair for judging no later than Wednesday evening by 8 pm. This gives the judges ample time to go through these entries. Physical copies will still need to be entered with an entry tag on Friday Between 12 and 8.
9. Sooke Fall Fair Association takes every precaution to ensure the safety of all exhibits, but should any item be lost, damaged or stolen, the Association will not recognize any claim for payment or the value of any portion thereof.
10. **Judges decisions are final.** Entries are judged by very specific rules and/or requirements for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places. If there is only one entry, it doesn't automatically win first place. Entries are judged by specific rules or requirements and 1st, 2nd or 3rd prizes might not be awarded. For example, if there is only one entry in a class it does not mean that entry will automatically receive a first place (or any place).
11. No animals allowed on Fred Milne Park property, unless they are entered in the fair. Two exceptions to the rule are the Pet Parade, which will take place on Sunday, registration starting at 2:30 pm, and Service animals are allowed at all times (Canines or miniature horses are the ONLY recognized service animals).
12. Children must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
13. Please respect all exhibits. Do Not Touch.
14. No Drugs are allowed on the premises or fairgrounds. Smoking and alcohol are only allowed in designated areas.

## Exhibitors Obligations and Liabilities

18. Entries must not be removed before 5:00 pm and no later than 6:00 pm on Sunday. Livestock can be removed after 3:00 pm Sunday.
19. Cash prizes and prize money must be picked up at the fair between 4:00 pm and 5:30 pm, Sunday. Note: Any monies not collected by 5:30 will revert to the Sooke Fall Fair Association. Prize money and points will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in each class. 1st place \$3 and 3 points, 2nd place \$2, and 2 points, 3rd place \$1 and 1 point.
20. The "Most Points" trophies will be calculated based on the number of 1st-, 2nd-, and 3rd-place entries. In the event of a tie, the person with more 1st-place points will be awarded. If it is tied in 1st place, the award may be shared. New for 2026: at the Awards Ceremony on Sunday, due to the fragility of the trophies, we will only have the grand aggregate trophies in person. However, all trophy winners will be announced and will receive a rosette, which will be presented at the fair. All Trophy winners will have the opportunity to have their picture taken with their name engraved on the trophy at the winter market. Trophies will not be taken home by the winner.
